HOW TO EMAIL A TEACHER

- 1 Subject Line**
Your subject line should be a short summary of your email (2-6 words).
Examples:
"Missing Assignments"
"Technical Difficulties"
"Late Work"
- 2 hello**
Say Hello
Just like you would in person, say "Hello" first.
Examples:
"Hi [Name]."
"Good morning, Mrs. Gracey."
"Greetings!"
- 3 Why Are You Emailing?**
Tell the teacher why you are emailing them. Include any relevant details.
Examples:
"I am emailing because..."
"I can't find..."
"Can you please help me with..."
- 4 End Your Email**
Close your email with a simple goodbye.
Examples:
"Thank you for your help."
"Have a nice day."
"See you in class."
- 5 Include Your Name**
Names are important, including yours! Let's use it.
After ending your email, do not forget to sign your name.

Your email/letter needs the following pieces in order:

- Subject line
- Greeting with name of recipient—example: **Good afternoon, Governor Holcomb,**
- Body of the email:
 - A strong starting paragraph. Copy and paste the **PURPLE** box (question 0)!
 - A paragraph about climate change. Copy and paste the completed sentences IN ORDER from the **YELLOW** boxes (questions 1-7).
 - A paragraph about what climate action technology we should support. Copy and paste the completed sentences IN ORDER from the **GREEN** boxes (questions 8 and 9).
 - A strong ending paragraph. Copy and paste the **BLUE** box (question 10).
- Closing/end your email—example: **Sincerely,**
- “Sign” your first and last name at the very end
